INTERNATIONAL KEYNOTE SPEAKER

MS SHARON PRESS

Sharon Press is the Director, Dispute Resolution Centre, Tallahassee, Florida and her area of expertise is in court-connected ADR programs for the past 11 years. Ms Press is President of the Society of Professionals in Dispute Resolution (SPIDR) and has been involved with the efforts of merging SPIDR, AFM (The Academy of Family Mediators) and the Conflict Resolution Education Network (CRENet).

INVITED SPEAKERS

THE HON. DARYL WILLIAMS, AM, QC, MP

Daryl Williams AM QC MP holds a law degree from the University of Western Australia and was selected as WA Rhodes Scholar in 1965. He subsequently obtained a Bachelor of Civil Law degree at Oxford University in 1967.

Mr Williams was a commissioner of the Law Reform Commission of Western Australia from 1982 – 1986 and chaired the Commission for a year. He was also President of the Law Society of Western Australia in 1984, and President of the Law Council of Australia in 1986 – 1987.

He was appointed a member of the Order of Australia (AM) for services to the legal profession in 1989.

Mr Williams has been the Federal Member for Tangney since 1993. During 1993 – 1994, he was Shadow Attorney-General, and Shadow Minister assisting the Leader of the Opposition in Constitutional Reform.

He was a member of the Joint Select Committee on Certain Family Law Issues and a member of the House of Representatives Standing Committee on Legal and Constitutional Affairs from 1993 to 1996.

Mr Williams was appointed as Commonwealth Attorney-General and Minister for Justice by Prime Minister John Howard on 8 March 1996. In October 1997, the Prime Minister announced Mr Williams' appointment to Cabinet as Commonwealth Attorney-General.

PROF LAURENCE BOULLE

Laurence Boulle is chair of the National ADR Advisor Council (NADRAC).

His book *Mediation: Principles, Process, Practice* has been published in separate editions in Australia, New Zealand, Canada, South Africa, Singapore and the United Kingdom. He is editor of the ADR Bulletin and Associate Director of the Dispute Resolution Centre at Bond University. He teaches and trains in dispute resolution subjects and has been a practising mediator for the past 10 years.

This field workshop will give participants the opportunity to identify at first hand the complexity, dynamics, and challenges for dispute resolution when applied to major public interest issues based on the allocation and use of natural resources.

Stradbroke island is one of a series of sand islands off the south Queensland coast. It is situated in close proximity to the capital Brisbane, but has managed to maintain a number of special natural values. Many of its attributes, from mineral sands to its tourism potential, attract dispute over who should access resource use, and how this use should be managed. Thus a mix of legal issues, social and cultural values, and scientific and technical issues will become evident on this field trip. The field workshop will also familiarise the participants with the needs and concerns of stakeholders who wish to access the resources of the island. The workshop will challenge participants to reflect upon the complex elements of resource based disputes, and in that context to question the potential role (suitability) of mediation, and the needs and skills of mediators involved in major issues of this type.

The trip will travel through the Redland Shire, which is the responsible local authority for Stradbroke Island, visit significant sites of mining, conservation and cultural value (e.g Brown Lake and Myora springs), and consider issues in relation to population, housing and lifestyle in the Point Lookout, Dunwich and Amity Point settlements.

A feature of this area is the historic land use agreement between the Redland Shire Council and the Quandamooka Land Council, representative of traditional owners. It is hoped to have speakers from some of the relevant stakeholder groups.

Participants will be provided with a guided workbook with activities appropriate to segments of the visit. This will be a workshop with style and setting. Relaxed attitude, casual clothes, hat and sunscreen.
